Key Note Speakers

A. Brent Eastman, MD, FACS

Chief Medical Officer & Corporate Sr. Vice President, Scripps Health N. Paul Whittier Chair of Trauma, Scripps Memorial Hospital La Jolla President-Elect, American College of Surgeons. A general, vascular and trauma surgeon and a long-established leader on the issue of trauma and emergency surgical care, A. Brent Eastman, M.D., FACS, is chief medical officer and corporate senior vice president of Scripps Health and N. Paul Whittier Chair of Trauma for Scripps Memorial Hospital in La Jolla, CA.



In addition to his duties with Scripps, Dr. Eastman is President-Elect and immediate past chairman of the Board of Regents of the American College of Surgeons (ACS), the largest scientific and educational organization of surgeons in the world.

Dr. Eastman's clinical involvement with Scripps is focused on trauma care and trauma systems. He also serves as the chief liaison between Scripps and its 2,600 affiliated physicians, ensuring open communication between administrators and clinical professionals.

He is the sole physician on the Scripps executive cabinet, where he provides clinical expertise on system-wide issues. Dr. Eastman oversees clinical quality, graduate medical education programs, disaster preparedness, clinical research and other key issues across the Scripps system.

Dr. Eastman received his medical degree from the University of California, San Francisco, where he completed his general surgical residency and served as chief surgical resident. He also completed a year of surgical training at Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital in Norwich, England. Dr. Eastman began his career with Scripps in 1972 in the practice of general, vascular and trauma surgery.

Both nationally and internationally, Dr. Eastman has played a leadership role in the development of trauma systems. He is one of the co-founders of San Diego County's trauma system, regarded worldwide as a model. Before San Diego's trauma system was developed, the percentage of preventable trauma deaths in the region's hospitals stood at 22 percent. Since the system was deployed in 1984, the percentage of preventable deaths has declined to approximately 1 percent. Dr. Eastman has helped develop trauma systems throughout the U.S., England, Australia, Brazil, Argentina, Canada, Mexico, South Africa, India and Pakistan.

Dr. Eastman is an active member of many leading surgical organizations, including the American Surgical Association, the American Association for the Surgery of Trauma (AAST), International Society of Cardiovascular Surgery, Society of Clinical Vascular Surgery and the Pacific Coast Surgical Association. He is a member of the Board of Scientific Counselors, National Center for Injury Prevention (CDC). He is also President-Elect of the Naffziger Society (UCSF Surgical Society from 1990 to 1994).

Previously, he served as chair of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) Research Agenda Steering Committee. Dr. Eastman also helped create and was the first chair of the ACS Committee on Trauma's Trauma System Consultation Committee.

He participated in the ACS/AAST Distinguished Visiting Surgeon in Combat Casualty Program at the U.S. military hospital, the Landstuhl Regional Medical Center in Landstuhl, Germany in July 2007. He subsequently was granted and assigned the distinction of honorary member of the U.S. Army Medical Regiment, by order of the U.S. surgeon general. Dr. Eastman was recently awarded, by the United States Army Medical Department, the "Order of Military Medical Merit" July 19, 2011.

HENRY N. HARKINS BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE

Born in Montana in 1905, Henry Harkins spent most of his youth in Chicago, where he earned his medical degree from Rush Medical College in 1930. He subsequently received his surgical training at the University of Chicago, serving as Chief Resident in 1936. Following residency, Dr. Harkins began an active career in academic surgery, including fellowships in several European centers. Upon his return to the United States, he served on the staff of Henry Ford Hospital, and later at Johns Hopkins.

In 1947, Dr. Harkins became Chairman of the Department of Surgery at the University of Washington. Under his leadership, the Department gained a reputation for excellence that endures to this day.

Among Dr. Harkins' many contributions to surgery were work on traumatic shock, burns, hernia, varicose veins and a keen interest in gastric pathophysiology and surgery. Until his death in 1967, he remained active on numerous editorial boards and advisory panels. The Harkins Resident Paper Competition is a fitting tribute to the memory of this extraordinary surgical leader.

Dr. Eastman has authored or co-authored multiple publications and articles related to trauma. He served on the Institute of Medicine (IOM) committee that in 2006 published the landmark report, "The Future of Emergency Care in the United States Health System." In 2009 Dr. Eastman delivered the Scudder Oration, the signature speech on trauma care at the annual ACS Clinical Congress.

C. Anthony Blau, MD

Tony Blau, MD, serves as a Professor of Hematology at the University of Washington School of Medicine in Seattle. Dr. Blau upholds a commitment to providing a superior level of care for each of his patients, as he also serves as an Attending Physician at the Seattle Cancer Care Alliance (SCCA). At SCCA, he cares for patients on the leukemia service. He also co-founded a not-for-profit organization called Partners in Personal Oncology.



Dr. Tony Blau maintains a strong interest in developing a personalized approach to cancer treatment, and this theme influences many areas of his professional endeavors. In his role as a Co-Director for the University of Washington's Institute for Stem Cell and Regenerative Medicine (ISCRM), he conducts research on scientific discoveries in stem cells, gene therapy, and oncology, aiming to uncover new benefits and work toward a cure for current and future patients with cancer. Dr. Tony Blau and the other doctors at Partners in Personal Oncology foster a patient-centered philosophy that varies dramatically from those practiced in conventional oncology programs.

Some of the additional roles held by Dr. Tony Blau include positions as a member of the Fred Hutchinson/University of Washington Cancer Consortium and as a Co-Director for the Stem and Progenitor Cell Biology Program sponsored by that consortium. As for his many research efforts Dr. Blau currently works on projects involving the use of molecular diagnostics to treat acute myeloid leukemia.
